# FROM THE DEAN'S DESK

It is the time of year for University graduation ceremonies. On March 25th, 74 students graduated with the Diploma in Agriculture and since then one additional student has qualified for the Diploma.

J. A. Beckton of Maymont won the University of Saskatchewan Silver Medal for high standing and L. V. Nobbs the Scott Prize for the most distinguished student.

On May 11th, 72 students, the third largest class in the College's history will graduate with Thomas Marshall of Semans the most distinguished graduate. This class is 25 to 30 percent larger than those of recent years and, of course, the employment opportunities are poorer than they have been for some time. Consequently there are some 1970 graduates still seeking employment. If any former graduate knows of an employment opportunity, it would be appreciated if these new graduates could be informed of it through the Dean's office.

The College is entering into a new phase of activity involving the provision of some staff to the Animal Science Department of Makerere University College at Kampala, Uganda. The project is financed by the Canadian International Development Agency.

Dr. Doug Gibson is already in Kampala on an assignment of at least one year's duration. Dr. Dave Christensen and family expect to join Doug in early June.
