But maybe Dad's greatest strength was his love for his family. He was the ultimate father; a solid foundation for the family to lean on in troubling times. He was extremely proud of his children, grandchildren, and greatgrandchildren and loved to hear stories about their lives. And they were very, very proud of him. A good day for Dad involved having his family around him. His sense of humor and his smile will be missed, but remembered always by a great many people. In keeping with his wishes, there will be no funeral. A private celebration of Dad's life will be held at a later date.
