Seldom do we have the occasion to recognize a graduate of such outstanding stature as Vigfus S. Asmundson of

Davis, California who died on September 10, 1974.

Dr. V. S. Asmundson was born in Iceland in 1896, as a young boy came to Canada with his parents who settled in the community of Tantallon. He received his Certificate in 1915 from Saskatchewan and Masters from Cornell University. His Ph. D. was earned at the University of Wisconsin in 1939.

Dr. Asmundson was one of the nation's greatest research scientists in the field of poultry genetics and physiology. While at the University of California, Davis, Dr. Asmundson was honored with the poultry science research prize in 1931 and the Borden Award and Gold Medal in 1942. In 1964 the University of California, Davis, awarded him an Honorary Law Degree. The Avian Sciences Building on the U.C.D. Campus bears his name. The V. S. Asmundson scholarship fund which was established several years ago at U.C.D. to honor their former professor is a lasting tribute to a gentleman who gave much to poultry science.

Dr. Asmundson is survived by his wife Aline, two sons and two daughters. Vigfus S. Asmundson and Aline were planning to join our reunion in January. We are grateful to Spike Smith for the news of one of our distinguished


Dear Friends:
