The big event of the year for Ag. Grads is less than two months away, and judging by the reports at our last executive meeting, all appears in readiness for the weekend of January 12, 13 and 14, 1979. The details of the various activities are spelled out elsewhere in this edition.

At our most recent executive meeting (November 6), considerable time was given to discussing the report of the committee set-up in April, regarding the Wascana Institute Agricultural programs, and also to a discussion about the present fee structure in our Association.

In regard to the Wascana question, I can report that the discussion was lively, and that the end result was a unanimous agreement, that our Association should not let the matter drop, but continue to press for answers to questions we feel have not been adequately answered. The position of the executive initially was, and still is, that the Wascana programs will fragment existing University courses, and tend to compete with the University for students. It is interesting to note, that first year enrollment in the School of Agriculture this fall, is down substantially from last year. While no one can say that the Wascana programs have caused this drop in enrollment, no one can say either that they are not part of the problem.

In discussing the fee structure of our Association, most of us cannot think back to a time when the annual membersip fee was not two dollars (we obviously have not been aware of or concerned with inflation!) While our Association has never attempted to be a money-making organization, we should, I think, attempt to break even in terms of what it costs per year to look after each member. We have an excellent and energetic new editor, but he has no

control over increased costs for postage, printing and mailing. We have now reached the stage where the \$2.00 annual fee is not covering the service costs per member. in light of this, the Registrar, Secretary and membership committee will be bringing in a report at our next executive meeting. I suspect most Ag. Grads will be willing to dig a little deeper to keep the beloved Association from going too far in the red. After all, two dollars is barely a good tip these days!

DEAN GRAHAM PASSES

Dean Victor E. Graham '27, passed away in Saskatoon at 78 years. he served as Dean of Agriculture from 1948 to 1963.

Born on July 2, 1920 at Arundel, Quebec. He attended high school at Lachine, after which he moved to Saskatchewan, where he attended University, graduating with a B.S.A. degree in 1927. He later graduated with MSc and PhD degrees from the University of Wisconsin. During his academic career he was the winner of several scholarships.

Graham joined the College of Agriculture staff in 1930 as assistant professor, and became professor and head of the dairy science department, which position he held until becoming Dean

During his career he was awarded several fellowships including the A.A. A.S. (American Association for the Advancement of Science) in 1940, the AIC in 1951, and the Royal Society of Arts in 1956. (Dean Graham was very active academically, having written many papers on dairy foods processing and bacteriology) He also served the agricultural community well. Among some of his activities were: Director, Saskatoon Industrial Exhibition in 1948. and President in 1958 and 1959. He was also president of the Western Canadian Exhibition Association in 1959. He was an active member and was a past president of the Saskatoon branch of the Sask. Institute of Agrologists, a director of the Saskatoon Rotary Club, and was active in the Masonic order.






