Terry Karstens of Wilkie, was awarded the University of Saskatchewan Silver Medal at the School of Agriculture graduation held on April 18, in recognition of having the highest average grade in his final year. He had a grade point average of 7.52 out of a possible 8.00. Wayne Flaten of Regina (son of Glenn '56) was awarded the Scott Prize of \$100 for his combined leadership qualities and high academic performance. Wayne also gave the valedictory address to the nearly 400 classmates, parents, friends and University staff in attendance.

For the first time, students achieving a final year average of 6.00 or better, were placed on the Dean's Honor Roll. The guest speaker this year was **Lorne Hehn '58**, President of United Grain Growers.

Prof. **John Peters**, Director of the School, reported that they're moving to a 3-year format, starting in 1984-85. Students entering the School will be required to complete 3 twenty-week academic years to qualify for a diploma. The number of instructional hours students are required to take will increase from 1140 to 1650. The new requirement of 1650 hours will be comparable to similar programs in Alberta, Ontario, Quebec, and Nova Scotia.

The 3-year format will allow the starting and ending dates of each year to remain virtually unchanged.

Students will be able to choose to concentrate their studies in either an Animal Production Management, or a Crop Production Management, stream. They will do slightly

more independent learning, and have slightly fewer formal lecture and laboratory instructional hours.

The Saskatchewan Agriculture Graduates Association had a hand in suggesting appropriate changes.

He is also an amateur historian and has written a history of agrarian development in Western Canada. One of his main interests has been in the field of agricultural policy and it's economic and social effect. His university courses have centred on agricultural policy, marketing price analysis and history.

His other interests including the Sask. Ag. Grads Association, which he variously served as chairman of the committees and as president - the later in 1966. Phil was made an Honorary Life Member in 1983 and is this year's Honorary President of S.A.G.A. He has been active in church affairs, including 10 years on the board of the Unitarian Church.

Phil's other interests are many and quite varied. His accomplishments as a winemaker have enlivened and delighted many a faculty "do" - even those without hair have let it down. He's also a sort of Keynsian Picasso - his paintings are excellent.





David William Staniforth '44 passed away at Ames, Iowa on March 27 at the Mary Greely Medical Centre, of cancer.

Dave was born September 15, 1919, raised on the farm at Lashburn, received his B.S.A. degree from the University of Saskatchewan in 1944, and his M.Sc. in 1946 in crop science. He completed his Ph.D. program at Iowa State University in 1949.

He joined the Iowa State University staff in 1947 as a research associate, was made an instructor in 1949 and a professor in 1960. His early work was in weed competition in corn and soybeans, and he was largely responsible for herbicide evaluation. He was the recognized weed control expert in the U.S. midwest. He wrote several books and more than 50 publications on the subject.

He was one of six scientists to attend the eighth International Congress on Plant Protection held in Moscow in 1975.

Dave was a member of several learned fraternities, as well as such science organizations as the Weed Science Society of America, American Society of Agronomy, American Society for the Advancement of Science and the American Institute of Biological Science.

In 1978 he was made a Fellow of the Weed Science society of America, and was named "Man of the Year" by the Iowa Fertilizer and Chemical Association.

He married the former Earla Mac-Donald in Saskatoon on June 2, 1945 who survives him as do sons, David of Minneapolis and Arthur of Iowa City; daughter Margaret Denning of Naperville, Illinois: four grandchildren; brothers **Syd '48** of the University of Wisconsin and Jack of Lashburn.

Although following his and Earla's physical examinations last fall, it was discovered that he only had three to six months to live, he worked right to the time of his death. He had nine graduate students, was able to graduate four of them before his passing, and made arrangements for the others with the faculty.





Art is working on his post graduate in plant physiology at Berkeley.



Brent Flaten '80 has a new house in North Battleford from the avails of pollution - Allied Chemicals. He's on the "Greenpeace" hit list.


