GLASNOST ON THE RUSSIAN WHEAT APHID

Saskatchewan

The likelihood of an economic infestation of Russian wheat aphid developing this summer on winter wheat, spring wheat and barley is small. However, the high populations of Russian wheat aphid that exist in Montana and Alberta, could result in infestation of fall-seeded cereals in Saskatchewan. Experience in Alberta has shown that early-sown fall cereals are in the greatest danger of developing economic infestations.

Two research projects to reduce the impact of a Russian wheat aphid infestation are in progess at the Saskatoon Research Station of Agriculture Canada. Both receive funding support from the Saskatchewan Agriculture Developement Fund. One project is aimed at identifying aphid parasites, predators and diseases presently in Saskatchewan. These natural control agents may be valuable in helping to prevent Russian wheat aphid outbreaks and should be preserved. Also, we are evaluating parasites and predators of aphids from regions of Europe where native populations of Russian wheat aphid occur. Introductions of such aphid enemies could assist our native biocontrol agents in suppressing this pest. The other project is to monitor the arrival of Russian wheat aphid into Saskatchewan and to relate the distribution of aphids to environmental parameters should an infestation occur.

No Russian wheat aphids or associated damage have been detected in Saskatchewan this summer. We are continuing with regular weekly surveys to monitor aphid populations and their natural enemies at 14 locations in southwestern and southern Saskatchewan. As in 1989, weekly plant samples and insect net sweeps are taken at each of these locations. To date, numbers of grain aphids collected. from sweep samples are low but are beginning to increase in some districts.

Last summer, cereal aphids, particularly, English grain aphid, reached a peak about the third week in July. Aphid collections from spring wheat fields were mainly Engish grain aphid (75%), green bug (16%), bird-cherry oat aphid (8%) and western wheat aphid (less than 1%). Approximately 17 species of aphids were identified from roadside collections. Suction traps were located at Swift Current, Saskatoon, Scott and Indian Head in 1989. Two more suction traps were setup at Consul and Shaunavon in 1990. They collect winged aphids and a wide assortment of other flying insects. Approximately 80 species of aphids were captured by the four suction traps last year; these included the main cereal aphids but not the Russian wheat aphid.

The natural enemies of aphids collected by surveys included 10 species of ladybird beetle, six species of hover fly, one species of lacewing, two species of predatory bug, and a parasitic wasp. The seven-spotted ladybird beetle, which first became established in Saskatchewan last year, is now widely distributed in the province. This beetle and its larvae, feeds voraciously on aphids in the Maritime Provinces. In addition to the seven-spotted ladybird beetle, the 14-spotted ladybird beetle was released last year and the release of another species of ladybird beetle is planned for later this year when cereal aphid populations increase.

Alberta

The Russian wheat aphid over-wintered successfully near Lethbridge but in low numbers. As of July 20, Agriculture Canada, Lethbridge reports that winter wheat fields are heavily infested while many of the spring cereal crops in southern Alberta are also infested but at low levels. Because of the advanced maturity stages of these crops no insecticide applications will be necessary. Some late seeded spring cereals may still be in danger of economic infestations. The majority of aphids are winged and are in a migrating phase.

United States

The Russian wheat aphid continues to cause major concern and require control in the western United States. In Colorado, many of the spring grains are infested and by mid-June aphids were beginning to take wing. In Montana, some of the winter wheat was infested but adequate moisture allowed the crop to outgrow the infestation. As of July 20, Russian wheat aphid infestations were reported in late seeded seeded spring cereals were increasing rapidly in Montana. In Idaho, economic infestations were reported in April and insecticides were used in some areas for control. The infestations developed early in the season in Washington where parasitic wasps and ladybird beetles are being released for biological control.

SUNSET'S GLOW



Florence O'Neill-Hutchison Ph.D, wife of Les '27C, a pioneer in adult education in Canada, passed away in Ottawa at 85 years.

Born in Witless Bay, Newfoundland, she began teaching in a one-room school in Placentia Bay. At 21 she began teaching miners to read and taught school in the outports. She was forced to quit teaching due to malnutrition and exhaustion, brought on by her habit of giving her lunch away to students who hadn't any.

She went on to get her bachelor's degree at Dalhousie and returned to Newfoundland to teach literacy in her innovative way in the outports.

While studying for her Ph.D. degree in adult education at Columbia, where she was a Carnigie and Rockefeller scholar, she was offered a lucrative position which she declined to return to work in Newfoundland. She later became head of the department of education's adult education department.

Finally in 1963, she became head of adult education for the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs from which she retired in 1970 in Ottawa.

In 1974 she was awarded the **Order of Canada** in recognition of her work in the outports. In the words of Elayne Harris, who was helping O'Neill-Hutchison write her memoirs, "She (Florence) had incredible respect for all the people she worked with, and they responded to her caring."

In recent years, Florence made a \$30,000 endowment to Memorial University, "because I have a great deal of empathy with rural Newfoundlanders who may not have had as many opportunities to learn what college education is all about."

She and **Les** had 15 good years of marriage together. A step-daughter, **Dr. Patricia Hutchinson**, also survives.

Obviously a power in adult education, she was also the first Canadian to earn a doctorate in that field.

Harold C. Wilson '23S, father of Elwood (Woody) '50C, passed away in the Lutheran Home in Regina on May 19 at 92 years.

Harold was born at Stittsville, Ontario on April 26, 1898, and moved to Rouleau with his parents in 1911. After receiving his diploma from the School of Agriculture in 1923, he farmed first with his father and then on his own farm adjacent. He was active in the Rouleau Agricultural Society, Sask. Pool, the local school and telephone company, and the N.F.U.

Following retirement he sold memberships and accident insurance for the Dominion Automobile Association, and latterly occupied his leisure time with reading agricultural history and work with Westminster United Church. He was a life member of S.A.G.A.

In addition to his wife Rosena, he is survived

by his son **Elwood (Marvalon)** of Regina, son **Everett (Pat)** of North Battleford, daughter **Rosemarie (John) Strother-Stewart** of Regina, as well as nine grandchildren, a sister, **Clara Smith** of Regina and numerous other relatives.

Hugh Albert Riddell of Saskatoon, brother of Murray '49C, passed away in his home on May 29.


