Advisory Council to the College of Agriculture

Bill Cooper, SAGA Rep. on the Advisory Council.

Since taking over from Bob Bens '64C as your representative on the Advisory Council I have participated in two council meetings, April '93 and November '93.

Prior to leaving the council Bob Bens challenged "The System" by insisting that the council live up to it's constitutional mandate and become truly "Advisory", rather than what had become a traditional reporting session by various departments.

Since quoting from the council constitution during my annual meeting report, I was asked if we might remind our members via the newsletter just what the objectives of the council are.

Here it is as amended October 29, 1987:

Objectives: (Constitution of Advisory Council to College of Agriculture).

- 1. Objectives. The objectives of the Council relate to its main role, namely to facilitate communication between the academic and non-academic communities, and to assist the College in adjusting, in an orderly and effective manner, to the changing needs in agricultural teaching, research, service and extension. More specifically, the broad objectives are as follows:
- a) to provide advice to the Dean of Agriculture and the faculty on appropriate College goals, objectives, and activities,
- b) to act as a communication bridge between the College of Agriculture and the organizations and community leaders represented on the council,
- c) to act as a sounding board for present and proposed activities of the college to ensure that programs closely reflect the needs of the agricultural community both within and outside the province, and
- d) to promote good relations and to project a positive

image for the college within the community.

The April Council meeting did approve the Bob Bens proposal and as a result the SAGA was asked to prepare a report for the November '93 meeting.

What to Do! We formed a committee of Past Presidents (Bob Bens, Grattan O'Grady, Al McDougald, and Les Henry) We focused our report on one issue "The Diploma in Agriculture Program within the College of Agriculture". We chose to report on this matter for a number of reasons:

- a) the Johnson Commission report suggesting that the Diploma Program might be removed from the University environment.
- b) the declining enrollment in recent years.
- c) parallel agricultural training programs by various organizations and institutions.
- d) our overall concern for an educational program which will enhance opportunities for a self-reliant and profitable agricultural industry.

The report which highlighted 8 key areas of concern was presented to the November 9th meeting. The key areas were:

 A Vision for Prairie Agriculture, 2) The Role of the Diploma Program, 3) Proposed Market Survey, 4) Program Image, 5) Program Term, 6) Program Curriculum, 7) Marketing the program, 8) Letters and replies from the Ministers.

My final request to members - Please study our report (Write to SAGA Office for a copy). Should we pursue any particular action? Should it go in "File 13"? Please Advise!

News from the College of Agriculture

First of all, I'd like to congratulate the convenors of the 1994 Ag Grad Reunion. The dinner was held at the end of a very interesting and optimistic week of what is now the Crop Production Show, where we had excellent attendance and lots of business to discuss in the crops area. Despite the weather, the attendance at the dinner was first-rate, and it was a most enjoyable week-end.

At the College, we've had a very interesting and busy year with a tremendous amount of focus on the development of a new curricula, which includes a totally revised first year, and plans to incorporate an ag business minor and an environmental science program. As you will appreciate, the College tends to be a very traditional place and thus any modification of a degree program that has been highly successful needs careful consideration and much debate before it can be modified. Under the direction of Assistant Dean Gary Storey, we have had a number of committees bring together what is a new program. So far we have agreed on the format of the common courses in the first year, and this has a ripple effect on every other course in the College, and these are being ironed out at the present time. I think we will be very pleased with the results of this exercise.

On the research side, you will have learned from your local paper that the Crop Development Centre have had an excellent year with the release of no less than 15 new varieties. This

has to be almost an all-time record for any research institute, and puts emphasis on the role that University research scientists play in the Saskatchewan agriculture scene. I single out this research group because they have had a spectacular year, but I can assure you that most departments have similar items to report.

As I write this report, it is nearing the end of the academic year and the student body are focusing on examinations. The student societies have been very active on all Drag. fronts; they have raised an immense amount of money for various charities. The students also promoted Ag Discovery Day, held on the Friday before the Ag Grad reunion. At this event they had a series of invited speakers who dealt with new developments in agricultural research, and a forum dealing with career opportunities in agriculture. recovered enough to do some visiting in Alberta.




