

## Builder refuses to quit Kristjanson active at Gimli

When Leo Kristjanson retired from the University of Saskatchewan in 1989, he left behind an institution that had grown tremendously, both physically and academically, during his nine year tenure as president.

During his 'retirement' he has applied his legendary determination and inspiration to developing Gimli, Manitoba, his growing-up and current home.

Leo and a couple of his oldster friends had stopped for a morning coffee break when I came along to visit on September 26. They had been there for a couple of hours attending to a door that needed adjustment, and working on the stairs to the Huldudfolk hideaway in the attic. They were in the final stages of a three year, \$475,000 public building renewal project, that will serve that community for generations.

The project has been conducted under the general direction of the Gimli Municipal Heritage Committee, with financing of \$60,000 coming from the sale of the old town hall, \$200,000 from a provincial grant, \$51,000 in corporate grants and about \$30,000 from individual donations. The balance is a \$130,000 loan from the credit union, repayment of which should be no problem.

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*The school building, once attended by Leo Kristjanson, barely escaped the wrecker's ball a few years ago. Instead, it was completely rebuilt, with new windows, inside walls, flooring and lighting. An elevator, wheel chair accessibility and air conditioning were added to make it more functional. The place looks great. It houses the Town of Gimli offices, five other public offices, council and public meeting rooms, and a model classroom, circa 1920.*

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*A special feature is a circular staircase to the attic residence of Huldufolk bachelors (Icelandic spirit people), Snorri and Snaebjorn. Kristjanson claims he has chatted with them but they are bashful and have not spoken to anyone else.*

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Much of the work was done by retirees like Leo, who jokingly refers to the mostly 70 to 80-year old crew as the PAP gang - fellows who are troubled by such ailments as prostate, arthritis or Parkinson's disease. For example, Kari Oleson, age 80, laid 6000 square feet of hardwood flooring and half a mile of hardwood baseboard. Volunteer contributed 17,000 hours of work on the project.

Redevelopment of the Town of Gimli museum is likely to be the next community project and it will not be a surprise to see Leo Kristjanson lending significant support. Though slowed down by Parkinson's disease he continues to make a remarkable impact on Gimli, as he did on the U of S.

Leo sends greetings and a special hello to members of the Sodbuster Club.

Canada. Bob's innovative and pioneering studies in plant ecology has brought international attention to him and the University of Saskatchewan.

The province of Saskatchewan has conferred it's highest honor on two prominent members of the Saskatchewan Agricultural Graduates Association.

## President's Pen

The idea of an agricultural alumni association as a separate group was born in 1935. During University Farm and Home Week Gus Bell '30C, Murray Cooke '31C, Maurice Hartnett '34C, Ian MacArthur '32C, Red Mooney '33C and John Mitchell '25C, met socially with Sol Sinclair '32C. Those graduates realized the opportunity for good fellowship and acquaintance gathering. They shared this idea with other graduates and decided it might be successful.

The first formal meeting was held on May 10, 1935, with John Mitchell acting as chairman and Rupert Ramsey '29C as secretary. A constitution was adopted and membership fee of \$1 per year for college and 50 cents for school grads approved. It was raised to \$2/year in 1969 and \$4 ten years later.

The first annual meeting was on January 14, 1936, and it was reported that a newsletter was sent to all prospective members. It urged graduates to join and it also asked business organizations to employ graduates. Membership growth in the first year was dramatic and rose to 114 by the fall of 1935.

The above facts and many more are recorded in the *Historical Review and Register of Graduates*, written by Herb Clark '45C and Art Stilborn

## S.A.G.A. College Support Trust Fund proposed

At the S.A.G.A. annual meeting on January 12, 1996, members will be asked to consider a new initiative to support the College of Agriculture at the University of Saskatchewan.

The proposal is that the association proceed to set up a trust fund, the earnings from which would be used to help finance the activities of the College. This article is intended to explain the idea of a fund and encourage you to send in your ideas on the survey form enclosed with the newsletter and attend the annual meeting.

### University education financing trends

In the past the capital and most of the operating expenses of the College were supplied by governments. Federal, provincial and to a lesser extent private organizations and agencies supported research. Student fees were low.

More recently the public has been asked to pay a part of the capital cost - as in the case of the new Agriculture (and other) buildings. Government funding for research is going down and private funding is

going up. Operating funding from government sources is being reduced and student fees have gone up sharply.

The position has changed from reliance on university funding through taxation toward more direct support by individuals and non-government organizations. The outlook for the future is increasing reliance on non-tax funding.

### Preparing for the future

Some positive steps have already been taken to meet this emerging circumstance. The College has established an Endowment and Enhancement Fund that is attracting donations. And the various departments of the college are capturing much more private research money. Grads are coming forward individually and in the odd case as a group to offer scholarships and the like.

At most established universities much of the on-going, private support comes from alumni. Creation of a S.A.G.A sponsored College support trust fund would aim directly at that potential source of funding. It seems like a good time to do so, considering the need, a large body of graduates and a great deal of goodwill between the grads and their alma mater. Such a move would not have any negative effect on overall university funding, and the administration of such a fund could easily be coupled with other funds.
