In the summer of 1915, when Kenneth King was 20 he travelled by horse and buggy across Montana selling cooking utensils to earn enough money to continue studying entomology at the Montana State College of Agriculture.

Later, King was on the staff of the entomology laboratory at the University of Saskatchewan. Ralph Stutt'33C, who was in the Economics Division of Agriculture Canada and was also located in the Field Husbandry Building, recalls a close association with Dr. Ken King in the 1930s and 40s.

King, the son of a minister, switched from entomology to the clergy at age 61 when he was ordained a deacon in St. John's Anglican Church. Friends gathered at his Saanich, B.C. home on Friday March 1,1996 to wish him well on the occasion of his 100th birthday.


Bert deGooijer is reported still jumpin' for Joy and raising a family at Kelliher - four at last count.



Then they sent a delegation of students to a meeting and workshop of the Western Association of Agriculture Councils at Tucson, Arizona. They had a good opportunity to plug the Ag-Challenge and Jennifer Warken, one of the ASA reps, reports plenty of interest among the 80 delegates from 13 colleges gathered at Tucson.

Ag-Challenge involves competitions between the attending colleges. Students are selected through competitions within each college, to participate in debates, individual presentations and problem-solving teams. The U of S students generate the competitions and arrange for them to take place in June. Plans are also made for the students to see new things, for example, one day is spent at the Farm Progress Show in Regina and the balance in Saskatoon at the university and other interest points.

Saskatchewan-based businesses have been willing sponsors in the past and the students are counting on support again this year. S.A.G.A. and SIA have both contributed in the past because Ag-Challenge has been considered a very worthwhile ag student activity.

Work experience for students

In May 28 College of Agriculture students who have completed second year will take job placements in the new Program for Agricultural Co-operative Education(PACE).

The idea of PACE is to combine meaningful work experience with academic study to enhance the overall development of students.

Students who enter the co-op program will alternate work and study terms, graduating with a total of sixteen months of experience in their field of study. It will take them five years to graduate, instead of four, and they will also have to pay a tuition fee for the work terms.

France Bergeron, coordinator of PACE believes the program will have reciprocal advantages for the students and the companies that employ them.

This is the first co-op program in an agricultural college in Western Canada and there is little doubt it will be watched with considerable interest.
