University research park expanding



A gigantic PCL construction crane is hard at work, trying to achieve the 1997 completion date of the Atrium Building expansion, that will be the home to the park's planned biological fermentation facility. The new facility will cost \$9 million, \$3 million of which is being provided by the Canada-Saskatchewan Infrastructure Works Program. Innovation Place is putting up the \$6 million balance through a capital investment for engineering, design and construction.

Innovation Place, located along the north edge of the campus, is one of the most rapidly growing and successful university related research parks in North America. It builds on the strengths of the university in agriculture, information technologies, resources and life sciences, as well as the strengths of federal and provincial agencies located in or immediately adjacent to Innovation Place. The role of Innovation Place is to supply facilities on a commercial basis, to support the research and development community in Saskatchewan.

The 1500 staff employed by 95 organizations in 19 buildings within Innovation Place, contribute over \$120 million per year to the economies of Saskatoon and Saskatchewan.

Thirty-three of the 95 park occupants are agriculture related firms, making Innovation Place an internationally known centre of agricultural biotechnology.

But it should have the breadth needed to prepare students for off-farm employment, primarily in agriculture related jobs. These skills would also be of value in employment outside of agriculture.

Message from Dean Stewart:

Greetings to all SAGA members. Since there is limited space I will be brief.

The 1996 academic year is well underway. This year there are 705 B.S.A. registrants (an increase of 40 over last year) and 173 Diploma students, an increase of 20.

Following are selected College developments of potential interest to our alumni.

Program for Agricultural Co-operative Education(PACE).

Twenty-five students went out on their first work placement in May, 1996. Twenty are presently out on their second work placement. Students and employers are most enthusiastic about the program.

Plant breeding agreement

The Western Grains Research Foundation(WGRF) and the Crop Development Centre (CDC) signed an agreement in 1996 which provides for a multi-million dollar partnership over the next ten years. The WGRF is a producer-controlled organization whose mandate is to support research on grain production, utilization and marketability. The money directed to the CDC will be used to develop new wheat and barley varieties.

The CDC is one of the most successful plant breeding organizations anywhere. It has released 90 crop varieties since 1977, including Harrington malting barley, Brier feed barley, Plenty durum wheat, CDC Teal spring wheat and CDC Kestrel winter wheat.

PBS television series

CAP receives further recognition

The Saskatchewan Association for Lifelong Learning presented the 1996 Adult Education Program of the Year Award to the Certificates in Agriculture Program. This is the third major recognition this program has received since it was started in 1991.

Diploma program review

The review committee is co-chaired by Dr. Cedric Gillott and Dr. Bob McKercher. The review is in progress and the final report will be presented to the university vice-president (academic) in March, 1997. (see related stories elsewhere in this issue and in the August 1996 issue of SAGA .)

Distance education

AGRIC 111.3(Agricultural Science 1) and AGRIC 112.3 (Agricultural Science 11) are being developed for off campus TV delivery. These are

required first year B.S.A. degree courses.

TV vignettes on sustainable agriculture

Over the last several months, nine B.S.A. students have worked with faculty and the Division of Audio Visual Services in the production of public awareness TV vignettes. Funding for this project was provided under the Canada-Saskatchewan Agriculture Green Plan Agreement. College involvement in the project was coordinated by Assistant Dean Iain Christison.

Dupont Canada Inc. donates to college

Under the university's First and Best national campaign Dupont has donated \$45,000 to support the development of agriculture production and management courses for offcampus delivery. This will increase access to agricultural material for people unable to attend on-site course offerings. Distance education is considered a good way to move new technologies into leading edge farming.

Mahidol University exchange students

Eight undergraduate food science students from Thailand are taking U of S courses in term one for credit towards degree completion at Mahidol University. The exchange is proving valuable to the students in terms of academic learning and cultural awareness. Saskatchewan College of Agriculture students are eligible to participate in such reciprocal exchange programs.

The story of Ag-Challenge


