# **Lifetime Memberships Awarded**

### **Murdock MacKay 49C**

Murdock was born to a farm family at Briarlea, Sask. He served in the RCAF from 1942 to 1945 ending with the rank of Flying Officer. After graduating in 1949 he was appointed the Agricultural Representative in Prince Albert. He took upgrading courses in extension at various places during his career. In 1968 Murdock was promoted to Ag Rep

Specialist for the Indian and Metis. From 1972 until 1974 he worked on ARDA and Special ARDA projects in the Carlton, Saskatoon and North Battleford areas. In 1974 he was named Regional Coordinator of Ag Reps on Indian Reserves.

Murdock promoted and participated in a broad scope of programs. He was active in the 4-H program, hosted a half-hour TV program for 10 years and a thrice - weekly radio program for 19 years. He was a pioneer

in on-air programs that dealt with farming practices. Murdock established watershed Coop organizations in the St. Louis and Birch Hills areas. He was a key figure along with Alex Kennedy and Red Williams in the Agricultural Development Committee of the Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations. This led to the formation of the Saskatchewan Indian Agriculture Program Inc. in 1975 with the purpose of developing agriculture on the Indian Reserves. The Saskatchewan Indian Agriculture Program raised \$29M over the first five years and continued until 1985. Murdock has been an officer or director of many local and regional agricultural associations His awards include an Honorary Life membership in the Canadian Society of Rural Extension, Distinguished Agrologist award, Fellow of the Agricultural Institute of Canada and Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame.

Commission. He was also the president of the Saskatchewan Agricultural Societies Association.

He received the Saskatchewan Seed Growers' Association Outstanding Service Award and the College of Agriculture Distinguished Graduate Award. Roger is also an Honorary Life member of the Churchbridge Agricultural Society and an Honorary Life Member of the Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologists.

Currently CEO and Director of VIDO at the UofS and holder of the Canada Research Chair in Vaccinology and Biotechnology, Dr. Babiuk led development of the world's first genetically engineered vaccine for animal species and has recently expanded the research from animals to human health. Dr. Babiuk is committed to the advancement of science policy and research in Canada through his contributions to the Canada Foundation for Innovation, Genome Canada, Canadian Institute for Health Research and NSERC. He has made significant advances in the commercialization of biological research, serving as an advisor and consultant for investors and companies worldwide on the control of infectious diseases and the health and productivity of livestock. Lorne has been on the faculty at the UofS for over 30 years and holds numerous honors including being named an Officer of the Order of Canada, Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and Fellow of the Infectious Diseases Society of America.

## Kenton Possberg 98C - Possberg Grain Farms

Kenton Possberg and his wife, Pam, B. Comm 1999, operate a 13,000 acre grain farm near Humboldt. From when he was old enough to ride alongside his dad in the tractor, there wasn't much doubt which career track Kenton would take. Pam was born and raised in Saskatoon, but after their marriage she took to the farm like a duck to water. The Possbergs direct seed an eclectic crop mix including sunflowers, canary seed, lentils, flax, canola, wheat, peas and barley. By focusing on a high degree of mechanization and effective agronomic practices, Possberg Grain Farms has achieved an enviable production record, even in years when weather patterns were not favorable. With three full-time employees and four part-time workers during the hectic seeding and harvest seasons, the company's success is very dependent on the talents and training of staff. Their strategy in training their employees and incorporating them into important roles within the farming operation helped them win the Saskatchewan region's Outstanding Young Farmers Award last year. Staff members are encouraged to take training courses to improve their skill level in farm machinery operation and maintenance as well as in agronomic techniques. The staff is involved in the farm's budgeting strategy, giving them a heads up on all aspects of the business's operational side. Performance bonuses are used to reward staff for meeting targets. Adapting to the changing face of prairie agriculture has been the name of the game on both the production and business sides of the operation. The Possbergs feel that the combination of Kenton's degree in agriculture and Pam's degree in commerce plays an important role in their farming success. 1. Raise the Life Membership fee to \$100. The general


membership needs to approve any increase at the annual meeting in January 2008.

**Norman Boe 63S** retired from farming in 2005 and now resides in Rosetown.



#### Merlin William Vanstone 66 S

- passed away December 3, 2006 in the Palliative Care Ward at the Pasqua Hospital in Regina at the age of 62 years, after a long courageous battle with colo-rectal cancer. Merlin was born September 6, 1944 in Carnduff. He married Carol Tollifson November 4, 1972.
