

Voldeng named to Sask Ag Hall of Fame



Laverne Voldeng, a leader in the hog industry, was born March 13, 1941, in Spalding, Saskatchewan. He went to primary school in Naicam and finished his grade twelve at Lutheran College Bible Institute in Outlook. He obtained his degree in agriculture at the University of Saskatchewan and completed his masters in animal nutrition in 1967. He was a Professional Agrologist from 1966 to 2002.

After the completion of his degrees, Laverne was actively involved in the farm, his community and the hog industry. Laverne was a pioneer of hog production, being one of the first in Saskatchewan to build and operate a 300-sow farrow-to-finish hog operation. Along with a later grain venture, this was to become V and V

Alma was inducted into the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame in August 2007, Bryan in 2006 and Glen in 2005. Alma's spouse is **Bill Copeland 60C** and **Bob Copeland 85S**, is their son.

Bryan Harvey recently received a CSSA Presidential Award. According to the CSSA, "The Presidential Award is given to those who have influenced the science or practice of crop production so greatly that the impact of their efforts will be enduring on future science. Their work may have enhanced the yield or quality of crops, improved the potential utility of crop products, provided breakthrough techniques or unique materials for progress by others, or for our understanding of some aspect of crop science." He was also inducted as an Officer of the Order of Canada by the Governor General on 26 Oct 2007.

Laverne pioneered many hog production techniques. Among these: advanced record-keeping systems, early adoption of confinement technology (sow crates to reduce piglet crushing), artificial insemination technology (frequency and technique), on-farm computerized milling technology, innovative manure handling and utilization of manure nutrient technologies.

Laverne used his knowledge and experience in the hog industry to design training programs for SIAST. He was also a member of the Wecan Project development Inc.- an internationally focused consortium of complementary companies with products and expertise in the hog production sector.

Laverne served on the Board of Directors for the Saskatchewan Hog Marketing Commission from 1980-1983. During his tenure, the the hog price stabilization program known and SHARP and an IN TRANSIT Insurance Program were developed. As well, the Prairie Swine Centre, an internationally renowned research facility was opened.

Following in his father's footsteps, Laverne served on the board of directors of the Naicam Credit Union. Laverne had an instrumental part in ensuring the continued survival of Credit Union services in the community through his work during the amalgamation process with Advantage Credit Union (Melfort).

Distinguished Graduate Supervisor Award

With a storied history of guiding graduate students to successful industry, government and academic careers, Murray Fulton is the prototype of what many faculty supervisors aspire to be. A professor in the Department of Bioresource Policy, Business and Economics, College of Agriculture and Bioresources, Fulton received his PhD from the University of California, Berkeley in 1985 and joined the University of Saskatchewan that same year. Since then, Fulton has served as director of the Centre for the Study of Co-operatives, department head in Agricultural Economics and acting associate dean of Graduate Studies and Research. Since 1985, Fulton has supervised 36 graduate students, 11 at the PhD level. These students have gone on to successful careers in various sectors, with three of his masters students and five PhDs now in faculty positions around the world. His colleagues say although it would often be easier to give graduate students a ready-made research topic, he encourages them to pursue their own interests and ideas, and is always genuinely excited about the research of those under his tutelage.

Jeff Schoenau

Award for Distinction in Outreach and Engagement

With local, national and international accolades to his credit, Jeff Schoenau's contributions to soil fertility and management have significantly furthered the University's outreach and engagement mission. Schoenau received his BSA and PhD degrees from the University of Saskatchewan and is currently a senior research specialist in the Department of Soil Science in the College of Agriculture and Bioresources. He also holds the Saskatchewan Agriculture and Food Research Chair in Nutrient Management. His many research achievements have led to a number of awards, including the Agriculture Institute of Canada's Outstanding Young Agrologist Award in 1998, the Robert E. Wagner Young Scientist Award from the Potash and Phosphate Institute in 2000, the Saskatchewan Institute of Agrologists' Outstanding Young Agrologist Award in 2002 and the NSERC Synergy Award for Innovation in 2004. In 1992, Schoenau's work on a cost-effective soil testing tool and forecasting software led to the creation of the Plant Root Simulator (PRS)TM. The technology has provided a basis for fertilizer use on more than three million acres of farmland in Western Canada, and improved yields for a variety of grain, pulse and forage crops.

College News

On September 20, University Council officially approved the name change for the Department of Bioresource Policy, Business, and Economics - PBE for short (formerly the Department of Agricultural Economics). The department felt that the change was important because it better reflected the ever broadening scope of their teaching and research.

Members of the department have interests that encompass a broad spectrum of issues pertaining to the use and management of resources that are rooted in biological systems - from environmental sustainability, to the management of aboriginal lands, to the running of agricultural businesses, to rural development policy, to industrial organization in the agri-food sector, to the operation of safe and efficient supply chains, to consumer expectations, to economic policy making in the domestic and international arenas - to name only a few. Their work sits at the nexus of policy, business and economics. Labels are important signaling devices, and the new name more accurately signals to students, the university and the society what it is that the department does.

Update from the College of Agriculture and Bioresources

As indicated in the last SAGA Newsletter, in May of this year Dean Ernie Barber was asked to serve as Acting Provost and Vice-President Academic for the University while the search for a new Provost and Vice-President Academic continued. Ernie decided that he would accept this appointment but also decided that he would not return to the College as Dean. Hence the search for a new Dean is underway and I provide this update as Acting Dean.

On the academic front, an active recruitment program and a new degree appear to be paying off. Enrolment in the College has rebounded somewhat from last year with 486 students in the BSA program (although a far cry from the 761 in 1998/9!!) and 58 students in the first two years of a new B.Sc. in Agribusiness program. The latter program may have drawn a few students from the B.S.A. but is primarily drawing students directly from high school. A proposal from the College for another B.Sc. program (in Renewable Resource Management) is also making its way through the University approval process.

The Diploma program is a different story. This year only 18 students entered the program and 26 students returned from last year to complete the second year of the program (it had a peak enrolment of 316 students in 1977/8). Because of the steady enrolment decline over the last few years the College will be putting forward a proposal for new Diplomas in Agribusiness and Agronomy. These will consist mostly of degree-level courses and will be designed to allow students to transfer into a degree program after the

two years with no loss of course credit.

Looking to future enrolment trends, an important statistic for both the University of Saskatchewan and the College (both of which have traditionally relied heavily on students from within the province) is that after this year's Grade 12 graduations, the number of Saskatchewan high school graduates will begin to fall. Projections show a decline from approximately 16,000 graduates this year to approximately 13,000 by 2013-14. As this decline will be disproportionally higher in rural areas (traditionally a significant source of students) the College will need to continue its recruitment efforts, particularly in urban areas, among the aboriginal population and outside of the province.

Briefly in other areas, the College will be hiring five new faculty this year and is looking forward to seeing the ground broken on two major infrastructure projects (a Feed Technology Research Facility and a Grain Innovation Laboratory) at the intersection of 108th St. and Preston.
