The great event of the year for Ag. Grads is only a month or so away and judging from the reports at our last executive meeting, all activities are well in hand. The details are spelled out elsewhere in this edition.

In the October edition of SAGA I suggested that somewhere along the line we had failed to demonstrate either the need or the benefits of research to either the farmers or to "John Q. Public" in Saskatchewan.

This question came up for considerable discussion at our last executive meeting. The executive agreed that this certainly was the case and further suggested that Irene Ahner [68], our Advisory Council Rep., follow this up with the College of Agriculture Advisory Council. We hope that Irene will be able to explore this with the Council and come up with some suggestions.

Some ideas which come to mind and which I am sure are happening to some extent at present are:

 A percentage of all research budgets set aside for advertising the results.

 An annual research publication outlining both the on-going (where applicable) and the completed projects. This would be a joint effort by all research institutions and would be published in an easy-to-read form with special emphasis on the possible benefits derived by both the farmer and general public.

 The extension of research projects to on-the-farm testing.

· Expansion of Agriculture Canada sub-stations.

· Organized tours (farmers, industry, and extension) of research stations, sub-stations and on-farm test plots.

· This may be an important enough problem to justify a full-time coordinator of all Saskatchewan research

projects. This individual would be responsible for ensuring that the research findings were available to all those in the extension business and also to the general public.

There are many other ideas which could be explored in this regard. I also recognize that some of these suggestions are partially in place at present, however, the fact still remains that we are not demonstrating the benefits of research to either the farmers or the general populous of this province.

Our organization is fortunate in drawing its membership from many walks of life. We hope that this diversity will result in a good many new ideas coming forward to our executive. This would greatly assist us in finding some of the solutions to both the funding of research and also the extension of the research results.

You are probably tired of my continual harping on the need for agricultural research, however, many of us in the agriculture industry who have no control over price of our inputs or prices we receive for our produce realize that adequate research is a must if we are to survive in this very competitive business.

Letters to the editor are quite in order. Let's hear your views.
